In other words, the Season of Creation is the annual ecumenical celebration of prayer and action for our common home.

From Pope Leo's message for this year's 10th annual 'World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation':

The Encyclical <u>Laudato Si'</u> has now guided the Catholic Church and many people of good will for ten years. May it continue to inspire us and may integral ecology be increasingly accepted as the right path to follow. In this way, seeds of hope will multiply, to be "tilled and kept" by the grace of our great and unfailing Hope, who is the risen Christ. In his name, I offer all of you my blessing.

**About Emiquon:** At more than 6000 acres, Emiquon is one of the largest floodplain restoration projects in the Midwest. It's a migratory bird and natural prairie grass haven that offers recreational activities like birding, paddling and fishing, as well as educational opportunities. This year, Emiquon is celebrating its 25th anniversary with a guided 2-mile hike and a 'science day' that will teach about Emiquon's history and ecological contributions.

The prophet Isaiah proclaims that the Spirit of God can turn barren deserts into gardens of justice and peace: "A spirit from on high will be poured out on us, and the wilderness will become a fruitful field... The work of righteousness will be peace, and the effect of righteousness, quietness and trust forever" (Is 32:15–18).

These words will guide us during the Season of Creation 2025 (September 1 – October 4). They remind us that prayer must lead to determination and concrete action if this "caress of God" is to become visible in our world (cf. Laudato Si', 84).

Let us embrace this extraordinary year as a time to Raise Hope celebrating the 10th Anniversary of Laudato Si' and of the Laudato Si' Movement, alongside the 800 years of the Canticle of the Creatures.
